PROJECT SUMMARY  
[Whiting2012Apr / 1144]  
10 July 2012**

**OBJECTIVE**

- Continue from the previous report, striving to identify the parents of William Whiting.

**RESULTS**

- Examined the original registers of St. Matthew Friday Street and St. Magnus the Martyr Parish in London. Did not find information concerning the ancestral William Whiting or his supposed sister, Catherine. The original registers of St. Margaret New Fish Street (Catherine Whiting likely married Thomas Wiggins in that parish) were destroyed in 1666. The earliest existing registers for this parish begin about 40 years after Catherine's marriage.
- Learned that only a few published pedigrees produced by Burke, Marshall, and others include Whiting pedigrees.
- Compared the coat of arms used by the ancestral William Whiting's son William to the coats of arms used by Whiting families in England. The description of the coat of arms used by William Whiting Jr. matches perfectly with the coat of arms used by the family of Giles Whiting, rector of Etton, Northamptonshire.
- Began a study of the Giles Whiting family. A pedigree for this family is found in the 1619 heraldic visitation of Leicester. Only 11 grandchildren were included in this chart. According to the burial entry for Giles's wife Margerie, the couple had 41 grandchildren by 1627. Perhaps the ancestral William Whiting was one of them.

**RECOMMENDATIONS**

- Track the descendants of the Reverend Giles Whiting of Etton, Northamptonshire. In 1627 he had 41 grandchildren. Only 11 of them are accounted for in the 1619 heraldic visitation for Leicestershire. Of particular interest is the family of Giles's son John who was also an Anglican priest.
- Examine the will of John Whiting, eldest son of Giles Whiting. His will was proved at the Prerogative Court of Canterbury (1624/5; 155 Clarke).

- Strive to determine if Giles Whiting's brother Francis was the man of Croft, Lincolnshire, who christened a son William in 1600. That Francis had a brother William Whiting of Boston, Lincolnshire, whose 1618 will mentioned Francis. (The Whitings of Boston used a coat of arms similar to the one used by the ancestral William Whiting.) The Francis Whiting of Croft did not christen a daughter Catherine in Croft Parish, but he could have christened additional children in some other parish.
- Locate an exact description of the coat of arms used by the Whitings of Boston, Lincolnshire.
- Continue with the recommendations outlined in the Whiting 2011Dec report dated 25 January 2012.

The objective of this project was to continue seeking the identity of the parents of William Whiting. William was born in England, possibly about 1600, and immigrated to Massachusetts in 1633.

### **London Parish Registers**

One of the many recommendations made in the Whiting 2011Dec report dated 25 January 2012 was to search the existing registers of St. Matthew Friday Street Parish, St. Margaret New Fish Street Parish, and St. Magnus the Martyr Parish from 1590 to 1635 for (1) the marriage record of Thomas Wiggins and Catherine Whiting (1633), (2) christening records for William Whiting and Catherine Whiting, (3) the marriage record of William and Susanna Whiting, and (4) christening records for William and Susanna Whiting's children.

The registers of St. Mathew Friday Street Parish were examined, but none of the desired items were located. The only items found in the registers of St. Magnus the Martyr during the 1589 to 1635 time period were a 1603 christening of Mary, daughter of Edward Wiggen, and christenings for children of Samuel and Mary Whiting (this family was discussed in the previous report).

The registers of St. Margaret New Fish Street Parish were destroyed in 1666. This parish united with St. Magnus the Martyr Parish in 1670 and their registers were combined. Unfortunately, this is likely where Edward Wiggins married Catherine Whiting.

## Published Pedigrees

Another recommendation from the Whiting2011Dec report was to examine the works of Burke, Marshall, and other authors who compiled and published pedigrees. The objective was to examine pedigrees for Whiting families, particularly those of the East Anglia and London areas. William's family would likely be included in one of these publications since his family used a coat of arms. The following publications were searched:

- John Bernard Burke *Burke's genealogical and heraldic history of the landed gentry : including American families with British ancestry, founded 1837 by Sir Bernard Burke, illustrated with heraldic colour plates* (London: Burke's Peerage, 1939)
  - No Whiting or Witing entries
- Edward Walford *The county families of the United Kingdom, or, Royal manual of the titled and untitled aristocracy of Great Britain and Ireland : containing a brief notice of the descent, birth, marriage, education and appointments of each person, his heir apparent or presumptive, as also a record of the offices which he has hitherto held, together with his town address and country residences* (London : Robert Hardwicke, 1864)
  - No Whiting or Witing entries
- George E. Cockayne *The complete peerage of England, Scotland, Ireland, Great Britain and the United Kingdom, extant, extinct, or dormant* (London : St. Catherine Press, 1910)
  - No Whiting or Witing entries
- *Debrett's peerage, baronetage, knightage, and companionship : comprising information concerning all person bearing hereditary or courtesy titles, knights, companions of all the various orders, and the collateral branches of all peers and baronets* (London : Dean, 1899)
  - No Whiting or Witing entries
- George W. Marshall *The genealogist's guide to printed pedigrees : being a general search through genealogical, topographical, and biographical works relating to the United Kingdom, together with references to family histories* (London : G. Bell, 1879)
  - No Whiting or Witing entries

- *Burke's family index* (London : Burke's Peerage, 1976 New York, New York : ARCO Publishing)
  - Only one Whiting entry: Whiting, formerly of Etton, Northampton<sup>1</sup>  
DFUSA (Distinguished Families of America)

The Whiting family of Etton is discussed in the next section of this report.

## Whiting Coat of Arms

A third recommendation made in the previous report was to compare the coat of arms and family crest used by William Whiting Jr., son of the immigrant William Whiting, with the coats of arms used by different Whiting families in England to determine if they all descended from one common ancestor. Descendants of the original grantee would be tracked to learn how William fit into the family.

Originally, a coat of arms was granted to individuals, not families. Legitimate male descendants of the original grantee could inherit the right to use their father's coat of arms. The heir could use the original coat of arms of his father but younger siblings had to slightly adjust their father's coat of arms to reflect birth order.

The coat of arms used by the immigrant William Whiting's son is described in *The New England Historical and Genealogical Register* as follows:

*Arms: Azure a leopard's face gold between two flanches ermine, in chief three bezants*<sup>2</sup>

A graphic of the Whiting coat of arms followed the description.<sup>3</sup> (Both the description and the graphic are seen in documents 10a-b.) A better graphic of both the coat of arms and the family crest was located in Diane C. Watts *Heraldry - coats of arms: National Society Colonial Dames XVII Century* (see document 11).<sup>4</sup>

Armed with the description and graphic of William Whiting's coat of arms, the next task was to determine which Whiting families in England used the same or similar coat of arms.

Richard Sims's *An index to the pedigrees and arms contained in the heralds' visitations, and other genealogical manuscripts in the British Museum* was examined. No Whiting/Witing families for Lincolnshire, London, Suffolk, or Cambridge were included in this publication. But a Whiting family of Leicestershire, originally of Northamptonshire, was included.<sup>5</sup>

Burke's publication, *The general armory of England, Scotland, Ireland and Wales: comprising a registry of armorial bearings from the earliest to the present time*, listed four distinct Whiting entries, including the family from Northamptonshire and Leicestershire.<sup>6</sup>

1. Whiting of Wood, Devonshire. Robert Whiting living (Edward IV).
  - a. Description: Ar. A bend wavy cotised sa.
2. Whiting of Etton, Northamptonshire; St. Martin's, London; and Desford, Leicestershire. Rev. John Whiting and Nathaniel Whiting Esq. of Desford (James I), sons of Giles Whiting Esq. of Etton.
  - a. Description: per saltire az. and erm. A leopard's face or, in chief three bezants.
3. Whiting of London.
  - a. Description: Gyronny of four ar. and az. on a chief of the first three leopards' faces of the second.
4. Whiting of Sussex.
  - a. Description: Az. on a chief or, three leopards' faces of the field.

The description of the coat of arms used by the Whitings of Etton, Northamptonshire; St. Martin's London; and Desford, Leicestershire, matched perfectly

with the description of the coat of arms used by William Whiting Jr. The coat of arms for the Whitings of Devonshire was completely different from the other three coats of arms as it did not include a leopard's face. Therefore, the Devonshire group descended from a different Whiting progenitor. The coats of arms used by the Whitings of London and Sussex were similar to those used by the Whitings of Northamptonshire and Leicestershire, but they were not the same. Their coats of arms involved multiple leopards' faces, whereas the coat of arms used by the Leicestershire/Northamptonshire Whitings involved only one leopard. This suggests that the three groups likely descended from the same progenitor, but the Whitings of London and Sussex were more directly related to one another than they were to the Whitings of Leicestershire/Northamptonshire.

The 1619 herald's visitation records for Leicestershire were examined. Heralds were the Crown's representatives who documented the use of coats of arms to prevent false claims. Heralds interviewed persons claiming a coat of arms and recorded the male descendants beginning with the original grantee down to the individual providing the information. Not all descendants were listed (especially true for females, but also some males were not included) and not all information was accurate. The Whiting pedigree included in the 1619 herald's visitation was headed by the original grantee—the Reverend Giles Whiting of Etton, Northamptonshire.<sup>7</sup> Giles Whiting's coat of arms is described as follows:

*Arms. Per saltire azure and ermine, a leopard's face or, in chief three bezants.*

The description matched perfectly with the coat of arms used by William Whiting Jr. This one, but important, piece of evidence highly suggests that the immigrant William Whiting was a descendant of Giles Whiting. William's name does not appear on this pedigree. However, it is possible that not all of the descendants of Giles Whiting who were alive in 1619 were included.

According to the pedigree, Giles Whiting and Maria Carew had seven children—Abigail, Timothy, Robert, Sara, Martha, Nathaniel, and John. Children were listed on the

pedigree for his sons Timothy, Nathaniel, and John, but not for his son Robert. The ancestral William Whiting was probably born between 1600 and 1610. His age in 1619 would qualify him to be one of Giles Whiting's grandchildren.

The heraldic visitation of Essex taken in 1634 also included the Giles Whiting pedigree but with a few differences.<sup>8</sup> In this pedigree, the wife of Giles is Margery Carew, not Maria Carew (this information matches what was found in the original registers of Etton, Northamptonshire, that will be discussed shortly). Giles's son John was described as a Doctor in Divinity in London. Giles's son Timothy was named as the rector of Peckleton, Leicestershire. Giles's son Nathaniel was of Horspool Grange in Leicestershire when the pedigree was recorded. Giles's son Robert was living at East Ham in Essex. No children were included for any of the sons except for Robert who was likely the individual who provided the pedigree since (1) he was the only person whose name appeared with a date on the pedigree and (2) he was the only descendant of Giles listed on this pedigree who was then living in Essex.

An investigation of the family of Giles Whiting was initiated. Henry Isham Longden's *Northamptonshire and Rutland clergy from 1500* includes several Whitings, one of whom was Giles Whiting. The brief biography for Giles states that he matriculated from Trinity College Cambridge in 1569.<sup>9</sup> He was the rector of Panfield, Essex, from 1582 to 1587 but was deprived of that position. He became the rector of Etton, Northamptonshire, on 25 November 1587 and remained in that position until his death in 1627. He was buried at Etton on 20 June 1627. The biography lists Mary Carew of Essex as his wife. That information must have been derived from the 1619 Leicestershire heraldic visitation. The 1625 will of Giles Whiting named his wife as Margerie, not Marie. The biography included a list of Giles's children:

- 1<sup>st</sup> son John, rector of South Luffenham, Rutland
- 2<sup>nd</sup> son Timothy, vicar of Lilbourne, Northampton

- 3<sup>rd</sup> son Nathaniel of Desford, Leicester
  - 1<sup>st</sup> son Nathaniel, minister of Aldwinckle All Saints', Northampton
  - 1<sup>st</sup> daughter Ann
- 4<sup>th</sup> son Robert of East Ham, Essex near London
- 1<sup>st</sup> daughter Abigail
- 2<sup>nd</sup> daughter Sarah
- 3<sup>rd</sup> daughter Martha

The biographies also included three descendants of Giles Whiting. The biography for Giles's eldest son John stated that John matriculated from Emmanuel College Cambridge in 1592. John's career in the clergy included work at South Luffenham, Rutland; East Ham, Essex; and St. Martin-le-Vintry, London. He died in London in 1624. The biography included just three daughters as his children. It is recommended that John's will be sought to learn if any other family members were mentioned in that document. His will was probated at the Prerogative Court of Canterbury.

The second descendant of Giles Whiting mentioned in this publication was his grandson Nathaniel, who was thought to be the son of Giles's son Nathaniel. The third descendant was Giles's son Timothy who was the curate of Ashwell, Rutland, in 1601; vicar of Lilbourne, Northampton, beginning in 1605; rector of Markfield, Leicester, in 1610; and rector of Peckleton, Leicester, where he died in 1640. This biography credited him with seven children—John, Timothy, Nathaniel, Robert, Elizabeth, Martha, and Mary. Notice the similarities between the names of Timothy's children and the names of his own siblings.

Information located about the Giles Whiting family made them a family of great interest. First, Anglican records show that Giles and his sons John and Timothy were all Church of England clergymen. The ancestral William Whiting was a religious man, though he departed from the Church of England and became a non-conformist. One of William's sons (John) became a clergyman in America. Second, one of the sons of Timothy (Nathaniel Whiting) immigrated to Massachusetts about the same time as the ancestral William Whiting.

New FamilySearch has apparently merged two different Giles Whitings (possibly father and son) together. Birth dates and places for the children of Giles Whiting vary from 1510 to the 1580s in Leicestershire, Northamptonshire, Essex, Lincolnshire, and Somersetshire. Obviously the information is very unreliable and the inspection of original records would be necessary to gather accurate data. Since Giles Whiting was the rector at Etton, Northamptonshire, the search of original records began with that parish.

Etton's parish registers begin in 1587 with the arrival of Giles Whiting. Two christening records for children of Giles, probably his youngest two children, were located. His older children would have been christened elsewhere.

- Chr 12 Aug 1588 – Abigail, dau Giles Whiting<sup>10</sup>
- Chr 20 Jan 1591/2 – Robert, son Giles Whiting<sup>11</sup>

Robert's christening year of 1592 would probably eliminate him as a potential father of the ancestral William Whiting who was likely born between 1600 and 1610. Other Whiting entries that were recorded between 1587 when Giles Whiting became the rector of this parish and 1627 when he died are as follows:

- Mar 7 July 1603 – Sara Whiting and Robert Lambe<sup>12</sup>
- Mar 8 August 1605 – Abigail Whiting and Rowse Burton, gentleman<sup>13</sup>
- Chr 25 [?] September 1610 – Ann Whiting the daughter of Margar[.] + [Will or Niell] Whiting<sup>14</sup>
- Bur 30 September 1610 – Elizabeth, wife of Nathaniel Whiting<sup>15</sup>
- Chr 17 September 1612 - Nathaniel, son of Nathaniel Whiting<sup>16</sup>
- Chr 8 August 1619 - Judeth, daughter of Robert Whiting, borne in Etton parsonage<sup>17</sup>

- Bur 29 August 1619 – Judeth, daughter of Robert Whiting<sup>18</sup>
- Bur 11 February 1626/7 - Margerie, wife of Giles Whiting, parson, 80 years old, married [?], left 3 sons, 3 daughters, and 41 grandchildren.<sup>19</sup>
- Bur 20 June 1627 - Giles Whiting, rector of Etton<sup>20</sup>

Giles's daughters Abigail and Sarah married in Etton, but none of his sons did. Giles's son Nathaniel married sometime before 1610 as his wife Elizabeth was buried that year in Etton. He remarried before 1612 when his son Nathaniel was christened. Robert Whiting began christening his children here in 1619, but none of the children of Giles's son Timothy were christened in Etton.

According to a Whiting family record found in the binders provided by Mark Whiting, children of Giles's son John who were supposedly christened in Etton included a daughter Elizabeth (christened about 1592), a daughter Dorcas (christened about 1594), and a daughter Catherine (christened about 1596). This family record did not include exact christening dates and an initial inspection of the Etton registers did not produce these three entries. The data is suspect and must be checked.

According to the same Whiting family records, Giles's son Robert christened a daughter Katherine about 1621 in Etton. The importance of this information is that the ancestral William Whiting supposedly had a sister Catherine who married Thomas Wiggins in London in July 1633. Robert's daughter Katherine would have been too young to have married in 1633. But John's daughter Catherine (christened about 1596) would have been of the right age. Since John's children are not well documented, perhaps John also had additional children, including a son William who was not listed on the 1619 heraldic visitation.

A very interesting entry in Etton's burial registers concerned Margerie, wife of Giles Whiting, who died in 1627 at the age of 80. Her age at death calculates to a birth year of about 1547. According to the entry (probably written personally by her husband),

she left three sons (John had died in 1624), three daughters, and 41 grandchildren. The 1619 visitation accounts for only 11 of those grandchildren. Therefore, it is recommended that the families for each of Giles's children be studied in order to determine the names and numbers of children each family produced.

Giles Whiting made a will on 6 February 1625 that was revised on 4 April 1627 and proved later that year.<sup>21</sup> He mentioned the following individuals:

*1627 will of Giles Whiting of Etton, Northampton*

- Godchildren Robert Wright, John Bolton
- Brother Francis Whiting and to his wife and to each of his children
- To Robert Chatam my sister's son and to his wife and to his sister Susan
- To Elizabeth Amy and Hanna Amy my sister's daughters
- To Giles Warde my kinsman
- To Edward Joice my clerke
- To my son John's three daughters Elizabeth, Katherine and Dorcas Whiting
- To my son Timothy's children [the eldest son is John Whiting]
- To my son Nethercott's children
- To my son Lamb's children
- My grandchild Robert Lamb and to his brother William Lamb
- To Nathaniel, son of Nathaniel Whiting and to Ann Whiting his sister
- To my son Robert Whiting and his wife and his three daughters
- To daughter Nethercott, daughter Lamb, and daughter Burton and to son Timothy's wife, Nathaniel's wife, son Robert's wife
- Wife Margerie [this will was originally written in 1625 before her death]
- Son-in-law Robert Lamb named as the executor
- Son-in-law Nethercott named as the supervisor
- To my son Burton and to his wife (my daughter) and to Margaret her daughter
- To Richard Spencer and his wife

The will did not include a grandchild named William Whiting. However, not all of Giles's male grandchildren were named, and it is entirely possible that a William Whiting could have been among them.

Another possibility was also disclosed by Giles's will. Giles named a brother Francis who was alive in 1627. Perhaps William Whiting was the son or grandson of

Giles's brother Francis. During the previous project, it was learned that Francis Whiting of Croft, Lincolnshire, christened a son William in 1600 (however, he did not also christen a daughter Catherine in that parish). The Francis Whiting of Croft was a brother to William Whiting of Boston, Lincolnshire, whose 1618 will mentioned Francis. The Whitings of Boston used a coat of arms similar to the one used by the ancestral William Whiting.

One more source that contained a pedigree for the Giles Whiting family was consulted before time expired. *Burke's distinguished families of America: the lineages of 1600 families of British origin now resident in the United States of America: illustrated with heraldic colour plates* included two brief biographies concerning the ancestral William Whiting and Giles Whiting.<sup>22</sup> The only line traced for Giles was that of his son Nathaniel. A William Whiting was not mentioned.

## Conclusion

Examination of published British pedigrees and coats of arms led the search for William Whiting to the Giles Whiting family of Leicestershire and Northamptonshire. The description of the coat of arms used by Giles Whiting matched perfectly with the coat of arms used by the ancestral William Whiting's son William. In fact, these two descriptions matched better than did any of the other descriptions of the coats of arms used by other Whiting families in England that were reviewed during this project. This suggests that the ancestral William Whiting may have been more closely associated with the Giles Whiting family than other Whiting families in England.

## Recommendations

- Track the descendants of the Reverend Giles Whiting of Etton, Northamptonshire. In 1627 he had 41 grandchildren. Only 11 of them are accounted for in the 1619 heraldic visitation for Leicestershire. Of particular interest is the family of Giles's son John who was also an Anglican priest.
- Examine the will of John Whiting, eldest son of Giles Whiting. His will was proved at the Prerogative Court of Canterbury (1624/5; 155 Clarke).

1. William migrated from England to Cambridge, Massachusetts in 1633 with Thomas Wiggins. Wiggins had been in America before. Another source says that William first came to Cambridge in 1631 and later was an original settler of Hartford (New England Register vol. 103 pg 35).
2. An original settler at Hartford in 1636. He came to Hartford with Thomas Hooker, a reverend with the Puritans. Both William Whiting and Thomas Hooker were nonconformists. William was a wealthy merchant dealing with grain from America to England. He had a trading house on the Delaware River and at Westfield and had dealings with Virginia. He owned land in Connecticut and New Hampshire.
3. Dep. from Hartford to Connecticut General Court, 1637; a member of the General Court in 1637.
4. In 1638 he was allowed to trade with the Indians and in 1642 appointed to collect tribute of the Indians on Long Island and on the mainlands.
5. In 1640 William was admitted as a freeman. In 1644 he was listed as a merchant. In 1645 he became the constable in Hartford.
6. William served as the second colonial treasurer of Connecticut 1641-1647.
7. William was a Major in the colonial forces.
8. William served as commissioner of the United Colonies for Connecticut 1646-7.
9. William was a leading man in the Connecticut colony and was of a gentleman's status. He was a man of wealth and prominence. His estate at his decease was worth 9000 pounds sterling. He made several trips to England.
10. William made his will on 20 March 1643. Codicils were added on 2 April 1646 and on 24 July 1647. (William amended his wills before his voyages at sea to England.) The codicils indicate he had other children since the making of his original will. The will was recorded on 24 April 1649. William named his children as William, John, Samuel, Sarah, Mary, and Joseph. Joseph was likely born after the initial will was made as he was not mentioned in it; he was provided for in a codicil. William had a "sister Wiggins" who had children. He also gave money to Margery Parker, Mr. Hopkins, Mr. Webster, to the children of Mr. Hooker, to the children of Mr. Stone, to the poor of Hartford, to the town of Hartford, to the poor of Windsor, to the poor of Wethersfield. Mrs. Whiting had the will probated on 2 September 1647. William left money to his father and mother (in his 1643 will) if they were still living, and if not, the money was to go to his brother. The parents and brother were not named. On 29 October 1647 Mrs. Susanna (Whiting) Fitch by an instrument of resignation dated 27 June 1662 resigned her interest in the estate of Mr. William Whiting, deceased. On 5 October 1654, Mr. Webster, Mr. Stone, Mr. Fitch, Mr. William Whiting, Mr. John Whiting, presented to the court a

distribution of Mr. Whiting's estate agreed upon by them.

11. William was a man of wealth and education, one of the most respectable settlers in 1636 and one of the civil and religious fathers of Connecticut.
12. He was closely associated with George Wyllys and Thomas Wiggin.
13. Searches made by James Cunningham in England in 1949 - Deptford St. Nicholas, Kent 1592 to 1600 - produced no trace of William Whiting. He did find the marriage of John Whiting and Margaret Bonner on 22 December 1586 in Boston, Lincolnshire. According to the will of this John Whiting, he did not have a son William. The researcher stated that it is possible that the Whiting family was in Boston, Lincoln before the registers began.
14. A researcher located in the Bishop of Lincoln probate court a will dated 21 October 1617 (1617, i, folio 239) for John Whiting the elder of Boston, woollendrapier. John named a daughter Margaret, wife of Richard Carter; wife Isabell who receives his house in Boston; son James; son Samuel who was at Cambridge; son John; daughter Awdree, wife of Robert Wright. John is the eldest son. His son James is not yet 23. John marked, not signed, the will. Proved on 31 Oct 1617. Witnessed by William Whiting. No son William or daughter Catherine.
15. A William Whiting of Boston also left a will dated 1618. He christened a son William at Boston in 1602. The child christened in 1602 cannot be the emigrant because he would have known that his father was dead when he wrote his own will in 1643. However, he could be related. William's 1618 will stated that he was a woollen draper of Boston, had a wife Margaret, youngest son Isaac (minor), son Robert, son William, brother Francis Whiting, and cousins John Whiting and Richard Carter. The researcher assumed that the John Whiting who died in 1617 (the father of the emigrant Samuel Whiting) and the William Whiting who died in 1618/9 were brothers. However, William's 1618 will says that John is his cousin. "There was another brother Francis who may have had children and no doubt there were many other Whitings nearly related. The name occurs frequently in Lincolnshire probate courts." (Letter dated 18 June 1958)
16. William Whiting was using a similar coat of arms as John Whiting from Boston, Lincolnshire and John's son, the Reverend Samuel Whiting who migrated to New England and lived at Lynn, Massachusetts. Therefore, there is likely a connection between the ancestral William and these Whiting men of Boston, Lincolnshire. Several letters written by William Jr., his son, are sealed with a coat of arms which are a variation of those used by the family of Whitings of Boston, Lincoln. The coat of arms is described in "Roll of Arms" registered by Committee of Heraldry, New England Historical and Genealogical Society. Major William Whiting, original proprietor of Hartford, liv. 1687 - azure a leopard face gold between two flanches ermine in chief 3 bezants; crest a demi-eagle displayed with two heads proper (New England Register vol. 106 pg. 258). The family's coat of arms were quartered at a Chantry of St. Lawrence at Leake, which is not far from Boston, Lincolnshire. Gordon C. Whiting's book includes a graphic of the coat of arms for Thomas Whiting (1400s) and his descendants in Leicestershire and Essex (page 35). It is very similar to the coat of arms claimed by William Whiting (page 55). See Heraldic Journal, volume 1, pages 61, 160.
17. William was possibly living near his sister Catherine in London at the time she married in 1633 and returned to America with her and her husband in 1633.
18. Researcher in England found the Whiting surname popular in St. Magnus the Martyr parish in London. But no Catherine Whiting was listed.
19. A marriage found for a William and Susan Whiting. "William Whiting of St. Mary Magdalene Canterbury, woollendrapier, bachelor, 23, son of William Whiting, Alderman of Canterbury, who consents, and Susan Sabin, virgin, 17, dau of Alvert Sabin, Alderman of Canterbury, who also consents. To marry at St. Mary Bredman's Canterbury." William was christened on 2 April 1615 at St. Mary Magdalene, son of William. He had a sister Katherine christened on 19 Sep 1619. But the William and Susan Whiting who married in Canterbury also christened children in Canterbury down to 1653 and cannot, therefore, be the ancestors who were in America by 1633. (Letter dated 18 June 1958)
20. The 1648 will of James Whiting of Boston, woollen draper was examined. He named his wife Mary, son John (minor), son Samuel (minor), brother Samuel Whiting now in New England, sister Wright, brother John Whiting. So he was the son of the John Whiting who wrote the 1617 will.
21. A researcher stated he checked subsidy and assessment lists for London and found a William Whiting living on Thames Street in St. Michael Queenhithe parish in 1638 [but the ancestral William was in New England then]. The researcher thought this could be the ancestor. Another person of interest was Samuel Whiteing of St. Magnus parish which adjoined and was later absorbed with St. Margaret New Fish Street. The registers of St. Michael Queenhithe do not start until October 1653. (Letter dated 27 June 1958) Samuel Whiting of St. Magnus parish was a freeman of the Fishmongers' Company and was a member of the City of London Livery Companies in 1641. A William Whiting was a freeman of the Blacksmiths' Company. A Joseph, son of Samuel Whiting, attained freeman status in the Fishmonger's Company in 1651. This Samuel Whiting could be the same man who christened 11 children in St. Magnus the Martyr

parish. The researcher searched the records of the Fishmongers' Company. He thought that the William Whiting admitted to the Freedom in 1621 was likely the emigrant and that William was a brother of Samuel (whose family was in St. Magnus parish). The lead led to a search in Stroud, Gloucester. The "Register of Apprenticeship Bindings & Admissions to the Freedom, 1614-1668" for the Fishmongers' Company of London included: 18 June 1621 William Whitinge, late apprentice to John Whitinge, claiming his freedom by service, is admitted and sworn; 15 November 1619 Samuel Whitynge, late apprentice to John Cole, claiming his freedom by service, is admitted and sworn; 29 November 1624 Thomas Whiteinge, son of Thomas Whiting of the Stroude Water in Gloucester, yeoman, put himself apprentice to Thomas Roberts fishmonger for nine years from michaelmas last 1624. The researcher searched Stroud parish (which is incomplete before 1640) and Painswick in Gloucester. He found a William christened in 1622; no Catherine. He studied wills for Whiting testators of the Stroud and Painswick area. Nothing.

22. A John Dumbleton may have been a servant of William Whiting for two years before coming to New England and then for another 4 or 5 years in New England (History of Windsor, CT pg. 49, 155).

23. Longden's "Northamptonshire and Rutland Clergy" include information about Samuel, son of the John Whiting of Boston, Lincolnshire, who left the 1617 will. The bio for Samuel stated he was the son of John Whiting, merchant of Boston, Lincoln and was christened there on 21 November 1597. Graduated from Emmanuel College at Cambridge. Ordained a priest in 1621 at Peterborough. Served as a minister at Lynn, Norfolk and rector of Skirbeck, Lincoln, in 1625. Went to Boston, New England in April 1636 and then to Lynn, Massachusetts where he was a minister from 1638 to 1679. He died there on 11 December 1679. His eldest son John Whiting was a rector at Leverton, Nottingham.

24. Steven Whiting Hatch stated that "Suffolk Emigrants" declares that the Whiting family came from Suffolk County, England in the vicinity of Basford. (There isn't a parish named Basford in Suffolk, but there is a parish named Boxford. A christening for a William, son of William and Elizabeth Whiting, was found in Aldringham parish dated 9 September 1600.). Holmes' "Dictionary of Ancestral Heads of New England Families" states he came from Boxford, Sussex. (There isn't a parish named Boxford in Sussex but there is a parish named Boxgrove.)

25. Two old undated, unsigned pieces of paper located by Evelyn W. Baird in 1998 while at the Connecticut Historical Society stated that William's wife Susanna was Susanna Wiggins. The researcher did not know the origin of this information.

26. "Whitings in England Before 1650" by Gordon C. Whiting (1978) poses that the most likely place of origin (due to William's nonconformity) is East Anglia (which can include Lincolnshire).

27. Gordon C. Whiting states that Miss M. Packman located the administration of William Whiting's estate in England (1648) and that he left "any and all English property" to his wife. Miss Packman also believes that William could be closely connected to the Whitings of Boxford and Hadleigh in Suffolk or to the Whitings of Boston (and Deptford, Kent) in Lincolnshire. Gordon Whiting states that the Whitings of Boston, Lincolnshire loaned money to the colony of Massachusetts. In Gordon's book are listings of Whitings by county that Miss Packman collected. Many are from Lincolnshire and London--two prime areas for William Whiting.

28. A family tree found on FamilyTreeMaker concerning the Descendants of John Whiting states that William Whiting was born in Boxford "Sussex" and died in Hartford, Connecticut. His wife Susannah Wiggins was born in 1609 in Milford, Connecticut and married William in 1635 in Hartford. Also claims that William's son William was born in 1631 in Milford, Connecticut and his daughter Sarah was born in 1632 in the same place. This pedigree seems to contain multiple errors and speculation.

29. The coat of arms used by William Whiting Jr. matches perfectly with the description of the coat of arms used by the Giles Whiting family of Etton, Northamptonshire. Giles was the rector of Etton and died there in 1627. According to the burial entry for Giles' wife Margerie, the couple had 41 grandchildren by that year. Only 11 of these children were listed in the 1619 heraldic visitation for Leicester. Giles' sons John and Timothy and one of Timothy's sons were also clergymen with the Church of England. One of Giles' grandsons, Nathaniel Whiting, emigrated to Massachusetts about the same time as did William Whiting. Giles Whiting left a will in 1627 (Church of England. Consistory Court of the Diocese of Peterborough Probate records, 1541-1858 (Salt Lake City, Utah : Filmed by the Genealogical Society of Utah, 1958) (FHL British film 174844)). The will did not mention William, but it also did not name all of Giles' grandchildren. Giles Whiting's pedigree was also found in the 1634 visitation of Essex. Giles and his two sons who became clergymen are found in Henry Isham Longden's Northamptonshire and Rutland clergy from 1500 (Northampton, England : Archer & Goodman, 1938-1943) (FHL British book 942.5 D3L v. 15).
