## PROJECT SUMMARY

### OBJECTIVES

- Strive to determine how Margery Prichard, wife of William Parker, was related to William Whiting.
- Continue with recommendations from the previous project:
  - Seek more information about the John Whiting who was buried in St. Bartholomew the Great Church in London. Strive to find a probate record for him that may identify his parents or siblings.
  - Strive to find marriages for daughters of the Reverend John Whiting (Dorcas and Katherine). Then look for probate records for these women and their husbands to learn if any siblings are mentioned. (Note: it is possible that Katherine was the same Catherine Whiting who married Thomas Wiggins.)
  - Identify the parents and siblings of Dorcas Shipham, the presumed first wife of the Reverend John Whiting. Learn if her parents or siblings left wills that may have mentioned the children of Dorcas.
  - Examine the Carew probate records identified during the previous project. The objective is to learn if anyone mentioned Giles Whiting, his wife (Margerie Carew), or his children.

### RESULTS

- Studied Margery Prichard, wife of William Parker. Found death information and possible immigration records for William and Margery. Sought marriages between Prichard and Whiting individuals but did not find anything promising. Located three potential christening records for Margery but did not discover how she may have been related to the ancestral William Whiting.
- Sought a will for the John Whiting of St. Bartholomew the Great Parish in London. Searched indexes for courts with jurisdiction over London between 1681 and 1690 but did not find an entry for John Whiting who died in 1681.
- Sought marriages for Dorcas and Katherine Whiting, daughters of the Reverend John Whiting. Did not find suitable marriages (other than the marriage of Thomas Wiggins to Catherine Whiting, sister of William Whiting). It is possible that the daughters married in St. Martin Vintry, the parish over which their father presided. Early registers for this parish are no longer extant.

- Did not locate a christening for Dorcas Shipham. Since her Shipham ancestry was apparently entitled to a coat of arms, sought a heraldic visitation pedigree for Shiphams in Essex, Suffolk, London, and Middlesex. Did not locate a Shipham pedigree that named Dorcas. Also sought a Carew pedigree in the same four counties. Located Carew pedigrees in Essex and Suffolk, but neither mentioned the correct Marjerie Carew, wife of Giles Whiting.
- Examined four Carew and two Shipham wills; none mentioned members of Giles Whiting's family.

### **RECOMMENDATIONS**

- Track the three Margery/Margaret Prichards whose christenings were found in London and Cheshire. Determine if any of these women died young or married someone other than William Parker in England. Locate marriages for their parents and probate records for their fathers, if possible.
- Examine additional Shipham and Carew probate records for mention of the Giles Whiting family members. Such documents might provide clues needed to connect the ancestral William Whiting to the Giles Whiting family.
- Pursue Francis Whiting, the brother of Giles Whiting, as it is possible that his descendants may have used a very similar coat of arms to Giles Whiting and the ancestral William Whiting. Two potential men to have been the brother of Giles Whiting have been identified – Francis Whiting of Croft, Lincolnshire, and Francis Whiting of Castle Hedingham, Essex.

The objectives of this project were to strive to determine how Margery Prichard, wife of William Parker, was related to William Whiting, and then continue with recommendations from the previous project.

**Margery Prichard, Wife of William Parker**

Bernard S. Parker's publication, *Puritan Parker*, stated that Margery Prichard, wife of William Parker (the subject of the book), was related to the ancestral William Whiting. The author did not explain how she was related or provide any documentation to support this claim. Research during this project began by investigating Margery Prichard.

The American Ancestors website, sponsored by the New England Historic Genealogical Society, offers access to more than 200 million records covering New England and New York. Margery Prichard and her husband William Parker were sought in these databases in the attempt to ascertain Margery's relationship to William.

William and Margery Parker moved from Hartford, Connecticut, to Saybrook, Connecticut, during the later years of their lives. Both William and Margery died in Saybrook and were buried at Cypress Cemetery. According to the Saybrook Town records, Margery Parker died on 6 December 1680;<sup>1</sup> William Parker (noted as "William Parker the elder") died six years later on 21 December 1686.<sup>2</sup> The following information for William and Margery was submitted by one of their descendants on the FindAGrave website. None of the information was documented with sources.

- William Parker was born in England about 1614<sup>3</sup>
- William married “Margaret” Pritchard, daughter of Robert Pritchard of Hartford<sup>4</sup>
- “Margaret” Pritchard was born 6 December 1620<sup>5</sup>

Preliminary research could not verify that “Margaret” was the daughter of Robert Pritchard of Hartford. Neither could Margery’s birth of 6 December 1620 be verified. Although this information is found on several Internet websites, no credible source was cited that could prove the name of Margery’s father or her birth date. One example of these Internet sites is the William and Margaret Margery (Pritchard) Parker web page ([bapresley.com/genealogy/Hawkins/parker](http://bapresley.com/genealogy/Hawkins/parker)), which states Margaret was born 6 December 1620 in Hartford. The same web page also claims William Parker left England in 1633 with his wife Margery who was then age 17.<sup>6</sup> Both statements cannot be correct. If Margery was married to William Parker before leaving England, then she would not have been born in Hartford. If she were born in 1620 then she could not have been age 17 in 1633. This data was not properly evaluated before it was copied onto the web page.

Most sources state that William Parker married Margery before 1636. Torrey’s *New England Marriages Prior to 1700* states:

William [Parker] (-1686) & 1/wf Margery (Pritchard)/Allen? (1608-1680);  
by 1636; Hartford/Saybrook CT<sup>7</sup>

This statement indicates that one surname by which Margery may have been known was Allen. The statement also suggests that some evidence was found to indicate Margery was born about 1608. What is known is that the couple was married before 1636 when they appeared in Connecticut records as a married couple.

A marriage between William Parker and Margery/Margaret Prichard was sought in U.S. and England databases without success. A christening for Margery/Margaret Prichard was sought in England databases and just three possibilities were found:<sup>8</sup>

- Chr 20 Aug 1615 St. Bride, Fleet St., London – Margaret, daughter of Henry Prichard
- Chr 4 Sep 1616 St. Katherine by the Tower, London – Margeret, daughter of John Prichard
- Chr 23 Oct 1614 Hanmer, Cheshire – Margery, daughter of John Prichard

None of the three women was the daughter of Robert Prichard, Margery Prichard's supposed father.

Also considered was that "Prichard" may have been Margery's surname due to a previous marriage. Therefore, a marriage between a Mr. Prichard and a woman named Margery was sought. Nothing was found. Also sought were christenings for a Margery/Margaret Whiting in case Margery's maiden name was Whiting and she married a Mr. Prichard before marrying William Parker. The following three possible christenings were found:<sup>9</sup>

- Chr 14 Dec 1600 Boston, Lincoln – Margaret, daughter of William Whiting
- Chr 31 May 1607 Croft, Lincoln – Margaret, daughter of Robert Whiting
- Chr 20 Oct 1616 Painswick, Gloucester – Margaret, daughter of Giles Whiting

The 1607 christening for Margaret, daughter of Robert Whiting of Croft, was appealing because the christening year was close to the estimated birth year of Margery Prichard supplied by Torrey's *New England Marriages Prior to 1700*. If a marriage can be found between Margaret Whiting and a Mr. Prichard in the vicinity of Croft, then the interest in tracking this Margaret Whiting would greatly increase.

Some evidence was located that suggests William Parker and Margery Prichard met aboard ship and married after their arrival in New England. A Wikipedia entry regarding William Parker indicates that William immigrated in 1635, arriving on the ship *Matthew*. Margaret Pritchard was said to have been one of five women on that ship.<sup>10</sup> This statement was probably taken from Peter Wilson Coldham's *The Complete Book of Emigrants, 1607-1660*, which shows William Parker, age 17, and Margaret Pritchard, age 17, being transported on the *Matthew* to St. Christopher, Barbadoes, in 1635.<sup>11</sup> If this William and Margaret were the parties of interest, then they were both born about 1618. This approximated birth year correlates fairly well with the two christening entries for Margaret Prichards found in London.

Marriages between Whiting and Prichard individuals, Carew (Giles Whiting's wife's maiden name) and Prichard individuals, and Shipham (Rev. John Whiting's first wife's maiden name) and Prichard individuals were sought in England between 1550 and 1640. Only one possible marriage was identified, but it occurred in Gloucester, a location where no known members of the Giles Whiting family of interest lived.

- Mar 5 May 1603 Westbury on Trym, Gloucester – Thomas Whitinge and Mary Prichard<sup>12</sup>

What was found during this search was a potential first marriage for the Reverend Thomas Hooker.

- Mar 23 Sep 1619 St. Ann Blackfriars, London – Thomas Hooker and Mary Pritchard<sup>13</sup>

An Ancestry indexer extracted the maiden name of Thomas Hooker's wife as "Grams," but someone later corrected the surname to "Pritchard." Could Mary Pritchard have been the Reverend Thomas Hooker's first wife? Sources that detail Thomas Hooker's family state that the name of his first wife is unknown. His second wife was Susannah Garbrand, whom he married in Amersham, Buckinghamshire.

- Mar 3 Apr 1621 – Thomas Hooker and Susan Garbrand<sup>14</sup>

Thomas Hooker was at Emmanuel College until 1618. About 1620, he was rector of St. George's in Esher, Surrey. This placed him fairly close to the London parish where a Thomas Hooker married Mary Pritchard in 1619. In order for both the 1619 and 1621 marriages to have applied to the same man, Mary (Pritchard) Hooker would have died between 1619 and 1621. Her burial was not located in Ancestry's London databases, but she could have been buried outside of London. This remains an intriguing possibility, as Mary Pritchard may have been closely related to Margery Pritchard.

A timeline for Thomas Hooker's life indicates he preached at Chelmsford, Essex, between 1626 and 1629, and then at Little Baddow, a parish about five miles east of Chelmsford. This places Thomas Hooker within 14 miles of Panfield Parish, where Giles Whiting's son Nathaniel Whiting lived. If the ancestral William Whiting does link to the Giles Whiting family, perhaps he came in contact with Thomas Hooker during the 1620s in Essex. Thomas Hooker fled to Holland in 1630 and did not return to England for any substantial length of time before his immigration to Massachusetts.

At this point, research switched to addressing the recommendations from the previous project. No connection had been found between Margery/Margaret Prichard and a Whiting individual in England. Marriages between a Prichard and a Carew or Shipham were also not found. Three potential christenings for Margery/Margaret Prichard were noted in London and in Cheshire, but they were not pursued further at this time.

### **John Whiting of St. Bartholomew the Great Parish**

During the previous project, a John Whiting of St. Bartholomew the Great Parish was located. The monument erected to John and his wife Margaret included the Whiting and Shipham coat of arms, which strongly suggested that this John Whiting was a descendant of the Reverend John Whiting and his first wife, Dorcas Shipham. John's age at death placed his birth year at about 1607, which would fit as a son of the Reverend John Whiting. John died in 1681 at the age of 74. His will was sought in indexes to probate courts with jurisdiction over London. Rather surprisingly, nothing was found for John Whiting. It was hoped that his will would identify siblings that would verify his proposed parentage. If this John Whiting was indeed a son of the Reverend John Whiting by his first wife Dorcas Shipham, then the Reverend John Whiting may have also had a second son, William.

### **Daughters of the Reverend John Whiting**

Another recommendation from the previous project was to find marriages for daughters of the Reverend John Whiting (Dorcas and Katherine). If marriages could be found and their husbands identified, then probate records for these women and their husbands could be sought, as these documents might mention siblings. No potential marriage was found for Dorcas Whiting or her sister Katherine Whiting (excluding the marriage between Thomas Wiggins and Catherine Whiting, the proposed sister of William Whiting).<sup>15</sup> Neither was a burial record for Dorcas Whiting, first wife of the Reverend John Whiting, found. These desired entries may have been recorded in the parish registers of St. Martin Vintry, the parish where John Whiting served as rector and whose early registers no longer exist.

### **Dorcas Shipham**

A recommendation was made to identify the parents and siblings of Dorcas Shipham, first wife of the Reverend John Whiting, in order to locate probate records that may have mentioned her children.

A christening for Dorcas Shipham was not found in Ancestry's London databases or in the FamilySearch England christenings database. Since the monument for John Whiting (d. 1681) indicated that the Shipham family had a coat of arms, heraldic visitation records were sought, as Dorcas may have been named on one of them with her parents. Visitation records for the counties of Essex, Suffolk, Middlesex, and London were examined, but nothing was found that included Dorcas Shipham. Examination of these visitation records included a search for a Carew pedigree that named Margerie Carew, wife of Giles Whiting. Carew pedigrees were included in both Essex and Suffolk visitations. The Carew pedigree from Essex did not name a Margerie Carew.<sup>16</sup> But since visitation pedigrees did not typically list all children for a couple, particularly daughters, Margerie may still connect to this family. The Carew pedigree from Suffolk did name a Margerie Carew, but she married a Mr. Terrell and then a Mr. Gervis. This was not the correct Margery.

### **Carew and Shipham Probate Records**

A final recommendation was to examine Carew probate records located previously in an index. The objective was to find mention of members of Giles Whiting's family that would provide clues as to how the ancestral William Whiting was related to them. Probate records for Carew testators of Essex were the focus of this search, but a few additional records for Carew and Shipham testators of London were included.

1617 will of Margaret Carew of Shenfield, Essex<sup>17</sup>

WD 28 Jun 1617; WP 17 Jul 1617

Margaret named the following relations: eldest son Anthonie Carew; son Matthew Carew; cousin Edward (no surname provided); cousin William Hone; sister Hone; brother William Dogget.

1640 will of Anthony Carew Esquire of Hornschurch, Essex<sup>18</sup>

WD 13 Dec 1639; WP 17 Feb 1640

Anthony named the following relations: son Anthony Carew; daughters Margaret, Anne, and Frances (no surnames provided); godson Francis Seaborne.

1591 will of Roger Carew Esquire of Bricklingsea, Essex<sup>19</sup>

WD 18 Oct 1590; WP 20 Mar 1591

Roger named the following relations: niece Temperance Davie (a minor); wife Margaret; children Anthonie, Mathewe and Joyce Carew (minors); nephew Roger Carew; cousin Henry Carew Esquire; brother Doctor Carew Esquire.

1593 will of Joane Carowe, widow of Barnes Rothing, Essex<sup>20</sup>

WD 19 Dec 1592; WP 26 Jun 1593

Joane named the following relations: first husband John Dyer; sons John, George, and Raphe Dyer; daughter Agnes Deane; daughter Katherine Collyn and her husband Robert; daughter Anne Browne and her husband Roger; daughter Margaret Toson; son Thomas Dyer and his daughter Alice Dyer; son Thomas Carowe; husband Thomas Carowe; brother William Sorrell

1584 will of John Shipman,<sup>21</sup> gentleman of West Ham, Essex<sup>22</sup>

WD 9 Jan 1583/4; WP 11 Jan 1583/4

John named the following relations: wife Luce; cousin William White; kinsman Myles Leedes; cousin John Pragle the younger; sons George Kington and Edwarde Kington

1604 will of Richard Shepham or Shipham, merchant tailor of St. Thomas the Apostle, London<sup>23</sup>

WD 20 Jul 1604; WP 4 Oct 1604

Richard mentioned properties in London and Surrey. Relations named in his will were: cousins Thomas Shepham and George Shepham; Alexander, son of his cousin Thomas Shepham; Richard, son of his brother James Shepham; James, son of his brother John Shepham; son Bromley; and two daughters (not named) of his brothers John and James.

None of the examined wills mentioned members of Giles Whiting's family. It is recommended that the search for Carew and Shipham probate records in London and other areas of England continue.

## Conclusion

Death information and possible immigration records were located for Margery Prichard and her husband William Parker. The immigration records provided an estimated birth year for Margery of 1618. This date conflicts with the 1608 birth year provided by Torrey's *New England Marriages Prior to 1700*. Three potential christening records for Margery/Margaret Prichard were identified in England. Marriages between Prichard and Whiting individuals were sought, as such a marriage would satisfy a family link between Margery Prichard and William Whiting. No promising marriages were found. Exactly how Margery Prichard may have been related to the ancestral William Whiting remains unknown.

A will for the John Whiting of St. Bartholomew the Great Parish in London was sought but surprisingly, nothing was found for him. His calculated birth year and the Whiting and Shipham coats of arms that decorate his monument highly suggest that he was a son of the Reverend John Whiting and his first wife Dorcas Shipham. If John can be proven as the son of the Reverend John Whiting, then this would strengthen the possibility that the ancestral William Whiting might also have been his son.

Marriages were sought for Dorcas and Katherine Whiting, daughters of the Reverend John Whiting, but no suitable marriages were found (other than the marriage of Thomas Wiggins to Catherine Whiting, sister of William Whiting). It is possible that the daughters married in St. Martin Vintry where the early registers are no longer extant.

Information about Dorcas Shipham, wife of the Reverend John Whiting, was sought. Since her christening was not found, Shipham visitation pedigrees were examined, as one of them might have listed her with her parents. A Shipham pedigree was not found in the four counties searched. Two Carew pedigrees were located in Essex and Suffolk; neither mentioned Margerie Carew, wife of Giles Whiting.

Six Carew and Shipham wills were examined. Although none mentioned members of Giles Whiting's family, there are additional probate documents that remain to be checked.

### **Recommendations**

- Track the three Margery/Margaret Prichards whose christenings were found in London and Cheshire. Determine if any of these women died young or married someone other than William Parker in England. Locate marriages for their parents and probate records for their fathers, if possible.
- Examine additional Shipham and Carew probate records for mention of the Giles Whiting family members. Such documents might provide clues needed to connect the ancestral William Whiting to the Giles Whiting family.
- Pursue Francis Whiting, the brother of Giles Whiting, as it is possible that his descendants may have used a very similar coat of arms to Giles Whiting and the ancestral William Whiting. Two potential men to have been the brother of Giles Whiting have been identified – Francis Whiting of Croft, Lincolnshire, and Francis Whiting of Castle Hedingham, Essex.

As a young man, William Parker probably immigrated from England in the 1630's. In 1640, he owned land in Hartford, and he is listed as a Founder of Hartford on the Monument at the Old Center Church Graveyard (see picture at right). His homelot in 1639 was on the west side of the road from Seth Grant's to the Centinel Hill (later Trumbull St.)

He married [Margaret Pritchard](#) , daughter of Robert Pritchard, at Hartford, Conn. prior to 1637. Most of their know children were born in Hartford.

They removed to Saybrook, Conn. sometime before May 17, 1660, where William Parker is found in the early records in a court case against William Waller in which Parker's mare & foal were lost in the woods.

On Oct. 11, 1669, William Parker, Sr. was propounded a freeman from Saybrook.

Between 1672 and 1675, he was a representative or deputy at the General Court in Hartford for Saybrook.

In 1672 during a special session, the Court appointed Lieut. William Pratt & Sarg't William Parker to make an account of the ammo & artillery at Saybrook (due to a possible conflict with the Dutch).

In 1673, Sarg't Wm Parker was granted 100 acres of land in Saybrook, Conn., and in Feb. 7, 1678, he received five acres for his service in the Indian Wars.

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## William and Margeret Margery (Pritchard) Parker

William Parker 1612 in England and died December 28, 1686 (another source says December 21, 1686) in Saybrook, Middlesex, Connecticut. He married Margeret Margery Pritchard in 1636 in Hartford, Connecticut. Margery was born December 06, 1620 in Hartford, Connecticut and died December 06, 1680 in Saybrook, Connecticut.

William was an original proprietor and land owner in Harford, Connecticut in 1636, where his name is on the west face of the Founders Monument. Here his home-lot in 1639 was on the west side of the "road from Seth Grant's to Centinel Hill," now Trumbull St. He too part in the Pequot War (an armed conflict in 1637-1638 between an alliance of Massachusetts Bay and Plymouth colonies, with Native American allies - the Narragansett, and Mohegan tribe), against the Pequot tribe.) in 1637 and moved to Saybrook about 1643. He was a pillar in the church in 1646 and a Deputy of Connecticut General Court during the sessions in September 1652, May 1672, May and October 1673, October 1680, May and October 1681, May and October 1682, and May 1683. William was a Sergeant in the Saybrook Train Band, owned land in Saybrook, and he was one of the three appraisers of the estate of George Fenwick in 1660. He was also involved in the inventory of the estate of William Carmackle in 1666.

The History of the Parker Pen Company says: "In the autumn of 1633 William Parker left Dover, England with his wife Margery, aged 17, and eventually set sail from London on the ship "Matthew" departing May 21, 1635. Their ambitious journey no doubt may have been inspired by tales of the great migration in the prior few years by the Wellington Fleet, and several other convoys of ships carrying over thousands of settlers to the New World and The Massachusetts Bay Colony.

One can only imagine the anxiety and even fear of making such a journey. There must have been profound reason to undertake such a risk, to travel for months on open seas subjected to storms, disease and perhaps "ocean monsters" believed to be able to swallow entire ships. The reason was primarily the same as thousands of other Pilgrims and Puritans taking this great migration, in protest of the religious intolerance of the High Church establishment of the day.

Other countries such as France, Spain, Holland and Sweden also send convoys of settlers to establish communities in the New World. Land charters were given to wealthy merchants for the purpose of reaping the riches of this new trade market. The success of these settlers gaining foothold in the new land would eventually determine the future nationalities of America.

The Parker's ship sailed to St. Christophers, a small English Colony island in the West Indies. In the autumn of 1635 a Dutch trade ship deposited salt, tobacco, trade goods and the young Parker family to the docks in or near Boston.

Geoffrey S. Parker today relates that "soon after in 1636 they moved to Hartford, Connecticut where William Parker is listed as one of the original founders of this community."

The Parker's first child, Sarah was born "a little before Michaelmas" Oct 29, 1637, followed by Joseph, John, Ruth, William, Joseph, Margaret, Jonathan, David and Debora. Of these children several survived to adulthood, many having achieved notable accomplishments in their communities.

**William Parker** (1618–1686)<sup>[1]</sup> was an early **Puritan** settler in the **Connecticut Colony** and one of the founders of **Hartford**. He arrived in the **Massachusetts Bay Colony** in the summer of 1635 after sailing from London on May 21, 1635 aboard the ship **Mathew**. He settled in **Newtowne**, the community that is now **Cambridge**, and became one of the members of **Thomas Hooker's** congregation. He was one of the **founders of Hartford, Connecticut**.<sup>[2][3]</sup>

He married Margaret Prichard in 1636, one of five women on board the **Mathew**.<sup>[4]</sup>

His home lot in Hartford in 1639 was on the west side of the "road from Seth Grant's to Centinel Hill" which is now Trumbull Street.<sup>[5]</sup>

The location of his lot is evidence that he was with **Thomas Hooker's** party in 1636. He is also listed as an inhabitant who had a right to undivided lands. He was one of the Hartford settlers who served in the **Pequot War** and attained the rank of sergeant.

He received 36 acres of land in the division of upland in East Hartford in 1666 that he sold to William Pitkin and William Goodwin. He sold his share of land received in 1674 on the west side of Hartford to Thomas and Samuel Olcott. William Parker's six acres were sold in 1684 to Joseph Collier.

William Parker fathered ten children by his first wife. Prior to 1682 he married a second wife, Elizabeth Pratt, the widow of Lieutenant William Pratt. His daughter, Margaret, born about 1650, married Joseph Pratt in 1671, who was the son of **Lieutenant William Pratt** and Elizabeth (Clark) Pratt.

William Parker moved from Hartford to **Saybrook** in 1649. He was a large landholder and also had land in **Hebron** that he had acquired from Joshua, the third son of **Uncas**.<sup>[6]</sup>

Edward Johnson in his work published in 1654 wrote of him: "Mr. William Parker, a man of pregnant understanding, and very usefull in his place."<sup>[7]</sup>

William Parker was Deputy to the General Court at the special session of 1652, at the May sessions in 1679 and 1681, and at the October sessions of 1678, 1679, 1680, and 1681.<sup>[8]</sup>

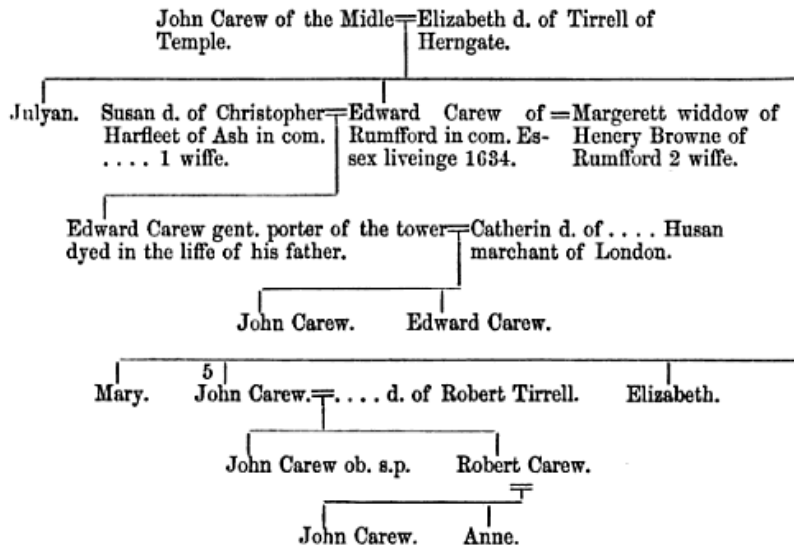

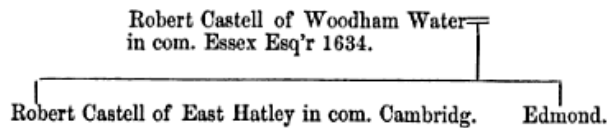
